The snow leopard is the king of the snow-capped mountains of Central & South Asia. It is one of the most solitary, elusive, rare and endangered predators in the world. It is a medium sized cat, especially adapted to survive in some of the harshest and most difficult environmental conditions. Only an estimated 3500-7000 snow leopards are left in the wild; and in India the figure is estimated between 200 and 600.

The snow leopard weighs approximately 35-50 kg., stands about 60 cm at the shoulder, and measures 1.8-2.3 meters from head to tail. The tail is usually 75-90% of its body length. This long tail helps the cat balance in treacherous terrain of its habitat. The snow leopard also uses its tail for covering its body, nose and mouth insub-zero temperatures. The snow leopard has large nasal cavities and well-developed lungs and is suitably adapted for life in higher altitudes.







